The Utility of and Indications for Routine Pelvic Examination

Well-Woman Visit. ABSTRACT: A well-woman visit provides an excellent opportunity to counsel patients about maintaining a healthy lifestyle and minimizing health risks. Given the shifting and complex landscape of care, in which many women may not receive all the recommended preventive services, obstetrician–gynecologists have an opportunity to contribute to the overall health and well-being ...

Well-Woman Recommendations - ACOG

Clinical pelvic exams should start at age 21, including annual Pap smear tests. According to ACOG, there is no clinical evidence that exams need to start before the age of 21. If there are no underlying conditions and if the patient is in the low risk category, annual exams may not be needed.

Final Recommendation Statement: Gynecological Conditions ...

Physical examination should include an abdominal and pelvic examination to rule out pelvic masses. The external genitalia and vaginal epithelium should be evaluated for vaginal atrophy, skin irritation, or ulceration . Simply spreading the labia while examining the patient in a supine position can be helpful to assess the maximum descent of the prolapse.

Preventive Services without a Pelvic Exam. Routine gynecological preventive services do NOT require that a pelvic exam be performed. Depending on the circumstances, either Z01.411, Encounter for gynecological examination (general) (routine) with abnormal findings, or Z01.419, Encounter for gynecological examination (general) (routine) without abnormal findings, may be used as the ICD-10-CM ...

Pelvic Exams: New Guidelines for Asymptomatic Women

2002 guidelines statement: The ACS and others should educate women, particularly teens and young women, that a pelvic exam does not equate to a cytology test and that women who may not need a cytology test still need regular health care visits including gynecologic care. Women should discuss the need for pelvic exams with their providers.

Acog Pelvic Exam Guidelines

The lack of evidence about the use of the pelvic examination has led to the development of conflicting guidelines from various medical organizations. Table 1 outlines recommendations for the routine pelvic examination from ACOG, ACP, the American Academy of Family Physicians, the Society of Gynecologic Oncology, and the USPSTF.

Pelvic examination is a common part of the physical examination; in 2012, 44.2 million pelvic examinations were performed in the United States. 1 Although it is a common part of the physical examination, it is unclear whether performing screening pelvic examinations in asymptomatic women has a significant effect on disease morbidity and mortality.

Preventive Services without a Pelvic Exam - ACOG

During the initial consultation with the patient and parent, the health care provider should inform them that the visit does not require an internal pelvic examination, unless indicated, and that the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (the College) recommends the first Pap test at age 21 years .

Most Women Don't Need Regular Pelvic Exams, New Guidelines ...

ACOG recommends that a comprehensive history should guide aspects of the physical exam, such as breast and pelvic examination. In other words, physical exam should be viewed in terms of a comprehensive provider-patient encounter.
