Central diabetes insipidus (CDI) is a rare disorder characterized by excessive thirst (polydipsia) and excessive urination (polyuria). It is not related to the more common diabetes mellitus (sugar diabetes), in which the body does not produce or properly use insulin.

The cause varies depending on the type of diabetes insipidus you have: Central diabetes insipidus. Damage to the pituitary gland or hypothalamus from surgery, a tumor, a head injury or an illness can cause central diabetes insipidus by affecting the usual production, storage and release of ADH.

Diabetes insipidus is caused by problems with a chemical called vasopressin (AVP), which is also known as antidiuretic hormone (ADH). AVP is produced by the hypothalamus and stored in the pituitary gland until needed. The hypothalamus is an area of the brain that controls mood and appetite.

When nephrogenic diabetes insipidus results from mutations in the AVPR2 gene (about 90% of the inherited cases of nephrogenic diabetes insipidus) the condition has an X-linked recessive pattern of inheritance. The AVPR2 gene is located on the X chromosome, which is one of the two sex chromosomes.

The highest intracellular lithium levels are found in the brain and the kidneys. Nephrogenic diabetes insipidus is the most common renal side effect of lithium.² Although nephrogenic diabetes insipidus may persist, acute renal toxicity is temporary. However, patients with severe lithium intoxication have shown persistent cerebellar damage with, for example, tremor, ataxia, and dysarthria, and persisting basal ganglia problems have also been described.

Diabetes Insipidus | NIDDK

Nephrogenic diabetes insipidus is a disorder of water balance. The body normally balances fluid intake with the excretion of fluid in urine. However, people with nephrogenic diabetes insipidus produce too much urine (polyuria), which causes them to be excessively thirsty (polydipsia).

The major symptoms of central diabetes insipidus (DI) are polyuria, nocturia, and polydipsia due to the concentrating defect. Treatment of this disorder is primarily aimed at decreasing the urine output, usually by increasing the activity of antidiuretic hormone (ADH; also called arginine vasopressin or AVP).

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
