Finally, the Clinical Dementia Rating (CDR) combines an assessment of cognitive abilities with function in order to give a grade on a 5-stage scale. The CDR scale is mostly used in research settings. While viewing dementia in terms of stages can help with understanding how the disease progresses, it is important to note that it is a rough guide and not an exact timeline of how the disease will unfold.

The Washington University Clinical Dementia Rating Scale (CDR) is a global assessment instrument that yields global and Sum of Boxes (SOB) scores, with the global score regularly used in clinical and research settings to stage dementia severity. 5 Although the CDR-SOB score has been considered a more detailed quantitative general index than the global score 6 and provides more information than the global CDR score in patients with mild dementia, 7 its utility in formally staging dementia ...

Clinical Dementia Rating (CDR) Scale | Massachusetts ...

The CDR is based on a scale of 0–3: no dementia (CDR = 0), questionable dementia (CDR = 0.5), MCI (CDR = 1), moderate cognitive impairment (CDR = 2), and severe cognitive impairment (CDR = 3). Two sets of questions are asked, one for the informant and another for the subject.

The Clinical Dementia Rating (CDR) scale uses a five-point system based on cognitive (thinking) abilities and the individual's ability to function. This scale is more commonly used in dementia research and less so as a communication tool between medical professionals, patients, and their families.

The Clinical Dementia Rating, known as the CDRS, was developed in 1979 at the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, Missouri, by John C. Morris as part of the Memory and Aging Project. The rating scale measures the stages and severity of several forms of dementia although it was originally developed to measure dementia of the Alzheimer's type.

Seven Stages of Dementia | Symptoms, Progression & Durations

The original version of the Clinical Dementia Rating (CDR) scale correlates with other dementia rating scales, and predicts nursing home (NH) admission and death. To validate the extended components of the scale, we analyzed data from subjects participating in a community-based study of dementia. The extended CDR scale also correlated with measures of dementia severity and NH residence.
