The London and North Western Railway completed its line from Stockport Edgeley to Northenden in 1866. The station was opened on 1 August 1866 and was located 100 yards (90 m) north of Cheadle High street at the point where the line (still in use) crossed Manchester Road on an over-bridge. The station was located on the western side of the road and was reached by steps leading up to it.

But in 1930 with problems persisting, its new owners, the London Midland & Scottish Railway, decided to construct a deviation, taking the route on an easterly alignment around the hill. Draycott Colliery continued to be served by the section of line heading into Cheadle from the north portal. The branch's southern section was abandoned.
