Choledochal cysts (a.k.a. bile duct cyst) are congenital conditions involving cystic dilatation of bile ducts. They are uncommon in western countries but not as rare in East Asian nations like Japan and China.

The surgical management of choledochal cysts is based on the cyst type and associated hepatobiliary pathology. In general, all bile duct cysts should be excised and bile flow re-established by mucosa-to-mucosa biliary–enteric anastomosis. External drainage alone has no definitive role in the surgical management of choledochal cysts.

Background. Choledochal cyst, a rare congenital cystic dilatation of biliary tree, is uncommon in adults. Their presentations differ from children and surgical management has evolved. Methods. Choledochal cysts are diagnosed non-invasively most of the times, with the help of an ultrasonographic scan, a computerized tomography (CT) scan or a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) scan. Should these modalities fail to produce a trustworthy, accurate diagnosis, invasive techniques may also be used with caution, such as endoscopic retrograde cholangiopancreatography (ERCP).

Choledochal cysts in adults and their complications

Choledochal cysts should be considered in the differential diagnosis in all patients with a history of biliary colic, recurrent cholangitis or pancreatitis with associated dilatation of bile duct, particularly if they are <40 years of age. Delay in the diagnosis increases the incidence of associated biliary pathology and suboptimal surgical therapy.

Although choledochal cysts are considered a disorder of childhood and infancy, the ages in reported cases range from newly born to 80 years old; however 60% of such cysts are diagnosed in patients less than 10 years old [1-6]. Epidemiology. Choledochal cysts (CCs) are extremely rare with an incidence of about 1/100–150,000 in Western societies.

Choledochal cyst is a congenital cystic dilation of a part of bile duct that occurs most commonly in the main part of common bile duct. Diagnosis of choledochal cyst is concluded upon disproportionate expansion of extrahepatic bile duct. Introduction. Choledochal cysts are rare cystic transformations of the biliary tree that are increasingly diagnosed in adult patients 1,2,3,4. These congenital lesions have a female:-male preponderance of 4:1, with an incidence in the West of between 1 in 50 000 and 1 in 200 000 live births 3; they are much more frequent in Asia 5,6. Nearly 25% of choledochal cysts are detected in the first year ...

Choledochal cyst - surgery

Choledochal cysts (CCs) are single or multiple dilatations of the intra-hepatic or extrahepatic biliary tree. If left untreated, they can cause morbidity and mortality from recurrent cholangitis, pancreatitis, sepsis, liver abscesses and cholangiocarcinoma.

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
