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### Cornea And External Eye Disease

Our corneal and external disease team also handles a number of other corneal diseases resulting from thinning, including keratoconus and various inflammations and degenerations, underlying systemic disease such as immune disorders, as well as trauma and post-surgical complications.

### Cornea/External Disease - American Academy of Ophthalmology

The cornea is the transparent tissue that covers the front of the eye. The sclera is the thick, white “ wall ” of the eye and the conjunctiva is the thin tissue that covers and protects the sclera. The eyelids function to protect these surface structures of the eye and to keep them moist with each blink.

The cornea is the transparent, dome-shaped, outermost layer that covers the iris and pupil in the front of the eye. Corneal tissue consists of five basic layers: epithelium, Bowman ’ s layer, stroma, Descemet ’ s membrane and endothelium.

Cornea and External Diseases involve disorders of the cornea (clear, dome-shaped surface that covers the front part of the eye), iris (colored part of the eye), lens, sclera (white part of the eye), conjunctiva (thin membrane that covers the sclera) and the eyelids.

Fuchs corneal dystrophy is a disease of the cornea. It involves dysfunction of the endothelial cells, the inner lining of the cornea responsible for pumping fluid out of the cornea and keeping the cornea thin and clear. When the endothelial cells lose function, the cornea becomes swollen, causing blurry vision.
