German Settlement in Pennsylvania An Overview

Six weeks later, on October 6, 1683, the ship Concord sailed into Philadelphia's harbor from Germany. On board were thirteen families. The German settlers felt an immediate kinship to their new home, since Pennsylvania's rolling hills and fertile plains resembled the terrain of the land they had left behind.

Organized German immigration to America began on October 6, 1683, with the arrival of thirteen Mennonite and Quaker families from Krefeld, Germany. They settled in "Deutschstadt" near Philadelphia, incorporated in 1689 as Germantown. Since that time, more than eight million Germans have emigrated to America, more than any other nationality.

The First Germans Franz Daniel Pastorius has been credited with officially founding the first permanent German settlement in America in Germantown, Pennsylvania in 1683. The devastation of the Thirty Years' War (1618–1648) and the wars between the German principalities and France caused some of the immigration of Germans to America from the Rhine area. Members of this group founded the borough of Germantown, in northwest Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania, in 1683.

After Germantown was founded in 1683, German immigration to Pennsylvania grew more rapidly. By the mid-eighteenth century, Pennsylvania's approximately 50,000 German immigrants made up about 40 percent of the colony's entire population.

Early Immigrants to Pennsylvania 1680s-1726

German immigration fell off significantly after the Revolution and did not pick up until after the 1820s when a famine set off a new wave of German immigration to North America. There were significant differences between these new German immigrants and those who are today known as the Pennsylvania Germans (those who came before the Revolution).

Germans began coming to Pennsylvania in large numbers at the end of the 1600s. Pennsylvania was the top destination for German immigrants arriving in Colonial North America. They settled first in the eastern counties and later migrated to western Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, and Virginia.

Soon after acquiring his North American colony from King Charles II in 1681, William Penn travelled extensively in Holland and German regions to openly solicit German settlers to Pennsylvania. In 1683, the first Germans, a small group led by Francis Daniel Pastorius, settled in "Germantown" in 1683.
