Furthermore, the AMA states that

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"informed consent is a communication process between physician and patient that results in an authorization or agreement to undergo a medical intervention or procedure." (1998)  
Failure to obtain informed consent can result in negligence or battery charges and could constitute malpractice.

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Informed consent - Medical Protection Society

Informed consent is when a healthcare provider — like a doctor, nurse, or other healthcare professional — explains a medical treatment to a patient before the patient agrees to it.

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Informed consent is a prerequisite for the ethical and legal validity of the emergency intervention in emergency medicine, since it protects the fiduciary relationship between the physician and

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patient; the principle of honesty that grounds this relationship; the principle of autonomy that necessitates right of self-determination; and the principle of respect for persons.

The process of informed consent occurs when communication between a patient and physician results in the patient's authorization or agreement to undergo a specific medical intervention. In seeking a patient's informed consent

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(or the consent of the patient's surrogate if the patient lacks decision-making capacity or declines to participate in making decisions), physicians should:

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Emergency practitioners must

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understand patients rights regarding informed consent. Rapid diagnosis and treatment can be lifesaving, and any delay in obtaining consent may have devastating consequences to the patient. Emergency physicians have an obligation to make decisive and rapid treatment decisions. In addition, they

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must know when patients can refuse treatment and when consent is not needed.

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Informed consent in emergency medicine, which is supposed to include the nature, benefits and risks of



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emergency medical intervention, differentiates with respect to definite groups of patients: (1) conscious patients, (2) unconscious patients, and (3) children and mature minors.

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Mental capacity. Informed consent is predicated on a patient's free will and mental capacity. A person who is sufficiently mature may freely give or withhold consent to any medical treatment. 8 If the patient is a minor, or of diminished ability to give consent (whether temporary or permanent),
