Thus, it is indeed possible for production to sprint above potential GDP, but only in the short run. At the far right, the aggregate supply curve becomes nearly vertical. At this quantity, higher prices for outputs cannot encourage additional output, because even if firms want to expand output, the inputs of labor and machinery in the economy are fully employed.

The production possibilities curve is also called the PPF or the production possibilities frontier. The PPF simply shows the trade-offs in production volume between two choices. All choices along the curve shows production efficiency of both goods. Production points inside the curve show an economy is not producing at its comparative advantage.

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
