Literacy development is less about a limited critical period and more about windows of opportunity that extend across early childhood, culminating perhaps around the age of 10. Literacy Development in the Early Years

Even though developmental accounts of literacy tend to focus predominantly on the early years, there is the need to account for the "long term developmental process ... to investigate how reading develops across the lifespan by building on the vast literatures in developmental psychology, cognitive psychology, expertise, motivation, and domain-specific learning, as well as reading research" (Anderson, 2007, pg. 415).

Early Reading and Writing Development

Developing early literacy skills makes it easier for children to learn to read. Children who enter school with these skills have an advantage that carries with them throughout their school years. However, more than 1 in 3 American children enter Kindergarten without the skills they need to learn to read (American Academy of Pediatrics).

A Balanced Approach to Literacy Development in the Early Years

Reading: its importance in literacy development. It's a good idea to read with your child often. It's best to start reading from birth, but it's never too late to begin. Reading with children from an early age helps them develop a solid foundation for literacy. It also promotes bonding and is good for your relationship with your child.
