In essence, Vygotsky recognizes that learning always occurs and cannot be separated from a social context. Consequently, instructional strategies that promote the distribution of expert knowledge where students collaboratively work together to conduct research,

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share their results, and perform or produce a final project, help to create a collaborative community of learners.

Vygotsky refers to this as cooperative or collaborative dialogue.

Lev Vygotsky and Social Learning Theories

The zone of proximal development has been defined as “ the distance between the actual developmental level as determined by independent problem solving and the level of potential development as determined through problem solving under adult guidance, or in collaboration with more capable peers ” (Vygotsky, p86).

LEARNING AND TEACHING SCIENTIFIC CONCEPTS: VYGOTSKY'S ...

Vygotsky explains the way in which learners develop their conceptual capacities, working just outside their independent capacity, relying on the supports or scaffolds of their learning environment: [A]n specific social nature and a process by which children grow into the intellectual life of those around them.

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According to Vygotsky (1978), an essential feature of learning is that it awakens a variety of internal developmental processes that are able to operate only when the child is in the action of interacting with people in his environment and in cooperation with his

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Vygotsky (1987) notes that private speech does not merely accompany a child ' s activity but acts as a tool used by the developing child to facilitate cognitive processes, such as overcoming task obstacles, enhancing imagination, thinking, and conscious awareness.

The Sociocultural Theory of Vygotsky | Its Psychology

Collaborative learning is a situation in which two or more people learn or attempt to learn something together. Unlike individual learning, people engaged in collaborative learning capitalize on one another's resources and skills (asking one another for information, evaluating one another's ideas, monitoring one another's work, etc.).

Vygotsky | Simply Psychology

In contrast, Vygotsky ' s theory promotes learning contexts in which students play an active role in learning. Roles of the teacher and student are therefore shifted, as a teacher should collaborate with his or her students in order to help facilitate meaning construction in students. Learning therefore becomes a reciprocal experience for the students and teacher.

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Since Vygotsky's original conception, the definition for the zone of proximal development has been expanded and modified. The zone of proximal development is an area of learning that occurs when a person is assisted by a teacher or peer with a higher skill set.

Vygotsky ' s theory maintains that cognitive development includes (a) the processes of mastering the external means of cultural development and thinking in relation to language, writing, counting, and drawing, and (b) the processes of higher mental functions, which include the concepts of logical memory, categorical perception, voluntary attention, and conceptual thinking.

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
