Generative phonology is a subfield of the general theory of language known as generative grammar. In generative grammar, it is assumed that the morphemes of a language are stored by the speaker in a special listlike device called a lexicon or dictionary, which contains all of the truly unpredictable, idiosyncratic information about the behavior—syntactic, semantic, and phonological—of each morpheme known to the speaker.

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The original conception of a generative phonology was as a component of the grammar that served to map lexically specified syntactic structures onto phonetic form, a representation appropriate to serve as the instructions to the language-independent mechanisms of speech production. This picture logically entails the notion that words, phrases, and sentences are already fully assembled in the input to the phonology.

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
