Symbolic capital, that is to say, capital – in whatever form – insofar as it is represented, i.e., apprehended symbolically, in a relationship of knowledge or, more precisely, of misrecognition and recognition, presupposes the intervention of the habitus, as a socially constituted cognitive capacity. 4.

Bourdieu also pioneered methodological frameworks and terminologies such as cultural, social, and symbolic capital, and the concepts of habitus, field, and symbolic violence. Bourdieu's work emphasized the role of practice and embodiment in social dynamics.

Pierre Bourdieu is known to have formulated the term 'cultural capital'. Bourdieu and John-Claude Passeron first used the term in their work called 'Cultural Reproduction and Social Reproduction'

(1973). The French term is le capital culturel. They used the term to justify a different theory, but the term, individually became popular.

Bourdieu's concept of cultural capital that refers to the collection of symbolic elements (e.g. skills, tastes, clothing) one acquires through being part of a particular social niche and his concept of habitus that refers to the physical manifestation of cultural capital owned by individuals due to life experiences are his major influential concepts that are very useful in deconstructing power in development and social change processes.

Bourdieu's Theory of Capital, Habitus and Field

Pierre Bourdieu developed the concept of cultural capital in the late 1960s when studying the French educational system and noticing that middle-class students tended to persist through school, while working-class students had higher drop out rates. Bourdieu argued that although education was supposed to serve as a vehicle for social mobility where students could work to their natural aptitudes, the educational system actually reproduced the existing social class structure; one important ...

The Forms of Capital. By social capital he refers to the network of 'useful relationships that can secure material or symbolic profits' (Bourdieu, 1986: 249): the amount of social capital that an individual can draw upon is thus the sum of the number of people in their network and the amount of capital so possessed.

Cultural Capital. Marx's influence is perhaps most evident in Bourdieu's theory of cultural capital. Like Marx, Bourdieu argued that capital formed the foundation of social life and dictated one's position within the social order. For Bourdieu and Marx both, the more capital one has, the more powerful a position one occupies in social life.

Symbolic capital. Bourdieu describes power in terms of 'symbolic capital', which comes with social position and affords prestige and leads to others paying attention to you. Using symbolic power against another implies symbolic violence, and may take such forms as dismissal and judging the person inferior. This power may be dispensed without words, using physical symbols and behaviors (such as 'looking down one's nose').

In "Cultural Reproduction and Social Reproduction" (1977), Pierre Bourdieu and Jean-Claude Passeron presented cultural capital to conceptually explain the differences among the levels of performance and academic achievement of children within the educational system of France in the 1960s; and further developed the concept in the essay "The Forms of Capital" (1985) and in the book *The State Nobility: Élite Schools in the Field of Power* (1996).

Symbolic capital is one of the forms of capital central to the work of Pierre Bourdieu. Although it is often simply glossed as "honor" or "prestige," it is important to note that the honor and prestige inherent in symbolic capital is the outcome of the conversion of other forms of capital. Bourdieu defines symbolic capital as "the form that the various species of capital assume when they are perceived and recognized as legitimate" (1989, 17; see also Bourdieu 1986).

Pierre Bourdieu: Theory of Capital (Social and Cultural Capital)

Social capital, conceptualized by sociologist Pierre Bourdieu, includes economic resources that one gains from being part of a network of social relationships, including group membership. Cultural capital, also from Bourdieu, includes non-economic resources that enable social mobility. Examples of cultural capital would include knowledge, skills, and education.

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
