On November 1 the plague reached London, and up to 30,000 of the city's population of 70,000 inhabitants succumbed. Over the next 2 years, the disease killed between 30-40% of the entire population. The plague population of England was in the range of 5-6 million people, fatalities may have reached as high as 2 million dead.

The Black Death in English towns. Estimates taking account of smaller towns are much more precarious, but it is possible that all told 10 per cent of England's population lived in towns of over 200 people, and a further 5 per cent lived in small boroughs, some with as few as 300 people.
