Winnicott highlighted the centrality of the mother's psychic functioning in the development of the infant's psychological processes. Winnicott believed that the mother and baby should not be viewed as separate entities but as one single object; as he famously wrote (1966): "There is no such thing as a baby, there is a baby and someone."

Winnicott held that the infant's development cannot be understood without considering its real environment, the objects, responsive or non-responsiveness the infant experiences, that then either build a "facilitating environment" for emotional growth, or alternatively cause the self to bury itself, its place taken by an inflexible, automatic substitute (the false self).
