Women took on new roles in the work force, notably in war production and agriculture. In 1914, the German armaments producer Krupp employed almost no women. By 1917, women made up nearly 30 percent of its 175,000 workers and a nationwide total of nearly 1.4 million German women were employed in the war labor force.

By July 1916 it was estimated that over three quarters of a million women had taken up 'war work'. The conflict opened up roles previously considered inappropriate for them- heavy industrial work, commercial driving, complicated and dangerous chemical work, the production of explosives.

700,000 women took up posts in the munitions industry, which was dangerous work. Many more women did hard heavy work, including ship building and furnace stoking. These types of jobs had excluded women prior to the war. In July 1914, before the war broke out there were 3.2 million women in employment.

As opportunities increased in some work, the war caused a decline in the uptake of other jobs. One staple of pre-war women's employment was domestic service for the upper and middle classes. The opportunities offered by war sped up the fall in this industry as women found alternative sources of employment.
